CONGRESS KNIFE PATTERN HISTORY

Origins: The Congress knife's origins date back to at least the early 19th century, with the name possibly referring to the way the blades come together at the center of the handle.

Target Audience: The knife was initially designed for the Antebellum South, with blades chosen to meet the agricultural needs of the region, particularly in the cotton and tobacco industries.

Blade Configurations: The most common configuration is the four-blade pattern, featuring two large sheepfoot blades for primary cutting, and a small coping and pen blades for secondary tasks.

Other popular designs include the 2-blade and 6-blade versions.

Uses: The sheepfoot blades were used extensively in the cotton and tobacco industry, allowing users to cut twice as long before needing to resharpen.

Coping blades are used for scribing and grooving, pen blades for drilling or notching, and spear blades for carving or shaping.

Historical Significance: President Abraham Lincoln was known to carry a six-bladed ivory-handled Congress knife, which is now in the Library of Congress.

Modern Popularity: The Congress knife is still a favorite among carpenters and woodworkers, and it is produced with many blade configurations, the most popular of which are the 4-blade and 2-blade designs.
